Self-Reliance Award Winner - Sabrina Fiscus

Many Pace staff have seen her at her worst and now at her best. A single mother with two boys, Sabrina lost her own mother at age 13 which she attributes to her bout with drugs.

Her boys were enrolled in our **Early Head Start** and **Head Start Programs** and she utilized our **Energy Assistance Program** to stay afloat.

Sabrina is a past substance user who has completely turned her life around. Addicted to heroin, meth, and bath salts, she was incarcerated numerous times, although she had the foresight to award guardianship of her boys to their grandparents.

With persistence – she forged ahead, and in 2020 she enrolled in college. She became gainfully employed as a Perinatal Peer Recovery Specialist. She expects to soon receive her degree in Social Work – ALL while working full time.

She is now dedicating her life to working with others struggling with addiction.




Dr. Michelle Pitcher, CCAP, Pace's Clinical Services Director, wins the 2022 National Lyndon Baines Johnson Leadership Award

This year Shaiah graduated with honors from Lincoln High School, received an associate degree through the Early College program at VU and in the fall will be attending Purdue University majoring in Engineering.

Johnnie has worked at Goodwill for 8 years and recently had to have surgery causing him to be off work for approximately 3 weeks. This put him behind on everything. His gas had been turned off and his water was about to be shut off. He had been paying a little extra every month trying to get his gas turned back on. Johnnie applied for Pace's **Energy Assistance & Water Programs**. Staff processed his application, and he was able to arrange for his gas to immediately be reconnected. Johnnie could not believe we were able to do that. He was very thankful and said, "You don't know what this does for me and my family."

Johnnie also let staff know that he had been struggling with everything and was raised to take care of things himself. We told him about the Vincennes Food Pantry, and he was able to receive a food basket.

When his daughter was younger, she was enrolled in our **Head Start** program. During this time, Johnnie was very involved and volunteered for Head Start on our Policy Council.

He said he likes working for Goodwill because he knows that he helps people! He also said that he's glad we are here, and he can tell that we care and help people too.




I'm Anamika Krishnan, an international student, pursuing my Master's Degree in


